GRADUATE SCHOOL ADVISING: Frequently Asked Questions

> How do I find the right grad program?

Graduate school programs vary widely.
Graduate and professional schools focus on providing specialized education or advanced training instrumental for the creation of new knowledge, advancement of research, and development of practices utilized by practitioners across industries

Our website provides multiple resources to help you explore graduate programs. Once you have generated a reasonable list of programs and schools that you are curious about, we encourage you to look deeper at each program's curriculum, explore where alumni from the programs tend to work post-graduation, and look at admission requirements.

> What can I do to stand out to grad school admissions committees?

Graduate schools are looking for similar traits to the ones that USC looks for in their undergraduate candidates; focused, passionate, well-rounded, career-minded, intellectually curious, and resilient.

Do your best to take advantage of all that USC has to offer, maintain a high GPA, engage in relevant experience, prepare well for the graduate admissions exams the schools are requiring, and make sure your application materials are tailored, thoughtful, authentic, and well-developed.

> How do I fund graduate school?

Financial assistance may be available in the form of grants, loans, fellowships, scholarships, teaching stipends, on-campus employment, and employer subsidies, etc. We suggest using the resources on our website to start your search by looking for scholarships, grants, and fellowships, followed by on-campus employment.

> How do I find undergrad research opportunities to give me more experience?

USC has amazing undergraduate research opportunities! Start your search using the following website created by the USC Undergraduate Education department: https://undergrad.usc.edu/experience/research

> What should I do if I want to take some time off before graduate school?

Taking time off before graduate school is very common. We recommend applying for fellowships or a full time job to stay engaged in your personal career development while demonstrating your passion for certain career paths. We also recommend asking for letters of recommendation before graduating.

During your time off, take note of application, financial aid, and scholarship deadlines ahead of time. It's easy to lose track of the months when you are not in school! This way, you will have plenty of time to get your application materials prepared, and applywhenever you are ready!

PRE-LAWADVISING: Frequently Asked Questions

> How do I register as a Pre-Law student?

Many students choose to indicate their interest in graduate school as part of their application to USC. If you didn't, don't worry! All USC students and alumni have access to our advising services and events. You can also sign up for our Pre-Law newsletter, where we share tips, upcoming events, and jobs and internship opportunities.

> What are the course requirements for Pre-Law?

Believe it or not, there are no course requirements to be Pre-Law or apply to law school! Instead, we encourage students to choose majors that interest them and which they can do well in. However, if you are interested in a specific field of law, you may want to research if there are majors that can help you succeed in that particular field. For example, most students going into patent law choose a STEM major.

> Can I be a Pre-Law student if I'm not sure about going to law school?

Of course! Being Pre-Law does not bind you to going to law school. Instead, we are here to help and support you on your academic and career journey. If you decide not to go to law school, we can work with you to explore other options!

> What should I do to build a strong law school application?

For better or worse, your LSAT and GPA are heavily weighted components of your application. Thus, do your best to keep your grades up and make sure you're prepared before taking the LSAT. Additionally, law schools like to see real-world work experience, leadership, and commitment. Stay involved in the community and try to find internships or jobs during the school year or summer to strengthen your resume and application.

> What extracurriculars should I do?

There isn't a "right" extracurricular to do as a Pre-Law student instead, seek our groups that align with your interests. However, be careful not to overcommit yourself! Instead of signing up for a ton of student orgs, select a few you can really get involved in and stick with them throughout your time in undergrad.

> What should I do during the summers?


Law schools like to see real-world experience, so try to find opportunities to get professional work experience. However, while legal work can be great for getting a glimpse of what being a lawyer is like, these work experiences don't need to be related to law. Instead, look for opportunities that interest you!



Interning with government agencies such as the U.S.

district attorney's offices, public defender's offices, and other local, state, or federal agencies can provide valuable experience. USAJOBS is the official job site for federal government internships.

usajobs.gov/ 3. Nonprofit Legal Organizations: Legal nonprofits and public interest organizations offer internships for prelaw students to work on advocacy, social justice, and public policy issues. We suggest starting your exploration with *Idealist*. *org*– they have a great search engine!

4. Corporate Legal Departments: Large corporations with in-house legal teams sometimes

offer internships for prelaw students to gain insight into corporate law and compliance. Networking and searching on corporate websites are helpful in finding such opportunities.

5. Courts and Judicial Chambers: Interning with a court or a judge's chambers can provide hands-on experience in the legal system. Local court websites may have internship listings.

6. Legal Aid Societies: Local legal aid organizations provide legal services to individuals who cannot afford representation. For example, websites such as the Legal Services Corporation list internship opportunities. lsc.gov/

7. Law Libraries: Law libraries at law schools, universities, and legal institutions may offer part-time jobs for aspiring lawyers interested in legal research and information services.

8. International Legal Organizations: Some pre-law students might seek internships with international organizations like the United Nations or international law firms with global practices.

CAMPUS EMPLOYMENT Graduate Assistantships are on-campus jobs that are limited to graduate students.

Some might be in the department or lab of your program. Assistantships provide either hourly pay, tuition remission, and/ or a stipend. The amount awarded varies by position. We recommend exploring your potential graduate school's academic department or employment website for potential employment opportunities.

Common positions include:

• Graduate Assistant (GA): Support an array of staffing needs

• Teaching Assistant (TA): Usually coteach introductory undergraduate courses • Research Assistant (RA): Assist in faculty research

• Jobs in Residential Life/Housing: At some institutions, the department of Residential Life offers jobs that provide tuition benefits, a stipend, free housing, and meal plans, such as a Resident Advisor, RA Supervisor, or front desk attendant.

Additional options: Paid campus jobs, paid internships, summer teaching opportunities, and paid research assistantships might be other ways to supplement your funding.

Note: Some employers provide subsidies to support their employees with attaining a graduate degree either part-or full time. For more info:


TIME TO REFLECT

TIME TO RESEARCH: Explore on and off **Campus Research Opportunities**

Research can be an amazing way to gain relevant experience that will help you explore your potential career of interest while building experience.

Gaining hands-on experience such as research is an important part of any welldesigned career development strategy whether you wind up applying to graduate or law school or not. Now is the time to explore options to determine if certain career paths are right for you. We highly suggest engaging in research and other experiential opportunities to help you make an informed decision regarding your future career path.

Focus on opportunities that will help you explore your areas of interest and broaden your experiences as a whole. Remembergraduate and law schools are looking for well-rounded candidates- every candidate should bring their unique qualifications when applying. Use research, internships, and other experiential opportunities as tools to explore your interests while demonstrating your focus and determina-

Timing-wise, the month before each new semester starts is a great time to approach researchers for potential research opportuni-

- 1- Use the links below as a starting point to start looking for opportunities that will help you explore your interests while gaining hands-on experience.
- 2- Once you find an opportunity of interest, tailor a resume and cover letter that explain your interests and skills related to the opportunity. Mentioning coursework and academic projects that have helped you gain experience in your application materials is a great to demonstrate your abilities to support the research efforts.
- 3- Apply to the research position posting. If a specific position is not posted, feel free to email the contact person or researcher directly expressing interest in a research position. Share your resume, cover letter, class schedule, as well as the number of hours weekly you may be able to commit to research. While many research opportunities are unpaid, we suggest mentioning if you have been granted federal work study funds. In your email,

we also suggest asking what the appropriate next steps might be in the process of securing a research role with them.

4- Follow up on the opportunity five business days after applying or reaching out if you haven't heard back prior. Please be patient in this process- many researchers will be in the field or lab and/or unable to answer emails on a regular basis.
