GRADUATE SCHOOL ADVISING: Frequently Asked Questions

> How do I find the right grad program?

Graduate school programs vary widely.
Graduate and professional schools focus on providing specialized education or advanced training instrumental for the creation of new knowledge, advancement of research, and development of practices utilized by practitioners across industries and professions

Our website provides multiple resources to help you explore graduate programs. Once you have generated a reasonable list of programs and schools that you are curious about, we encourage you to look deeper at each program's curriculum, explore where alumni from the programs tend to work postgraduation, and look at admission

> What can I do to stand out to grad school admissions committees?

Graduate schools are looking for similar traits to the ones that USC looks for in their undergraduate candidates: focused, passionate, well-rounded, career-minded, intellectually curious, and resilient.

Do your best to take advantage of all that USC has to offer, maintain a high GPA, engage in relevant experience, prepare well for the graduate admissions exams the schools are requiring, and make sure your application materials are tailored, thoughtful, authentic, and well-developed.

> How do I fund graduate school?

Financial assistance may be available in the form of grants, loans, fellowships, scholarships, teaching stipends, on-campus employment, and employer subsidies, etc. We suggest using the resources on our website to start your search by looking for scholarships, grants, and fellowships, followed by on-campus employment.

> How do I find undergrad research opportunities to give me more experience?

USC has amazing undergraduate research opportunities! Start your search using the following website created by the USC Undergraduate Education department: https://undergrad.usc.edu/experience/research

> What should I do if I want to take some time off before graduate school?

Taking time off before graduate school is very common. We recommend applying for fellowships or a full time job to stay engaged in your personal career development while demonstrating your passion for certain career paths. We also recommend asking for letters of recommendation before graduating.

During your time off, take note of application, financial aid, and scholarship deadlines ahead of time. It's easy to lose track of the months when you are not in school! This way, you will have plenty of time to get your application materials prepared, and apply whenever you are ready!

USCCareer Pathways

Develop experience graduate schools love by engaging in on- or off-campus research

Research can be an amazing way to gain relevant experience that will help you explore your potential career of interest while building experience. Gaining hands-on experience such as research is an integral part of any well-designed career development strategy, whether you wind up applying to graduate or law school or not. Now is the time to explore options to determine if certain career paths are right for you. We highly suggest engaging in research and other experiential opportunities to help you make an informed decision regarding your future career path.

Focus on opportunities that will help you explore your areas of interest and broaden your experiences as a whole. Remember- graduate and law schools are looking for well-rounded candidates- every candidate should bring their unique qualifications when applying. Use research, internships, and other experiential opportunities as tools to explore your interests while demonstrating your focus and determination.

Timing-wise, the month before each new semester starts is a great time to approach researchers for potential research opportunities.

1- Use this link:

2- Once you find an opportunity of interest, tailor a resume and cover letter that explain your interests and skills related to the opportunity. Mentioning coursework and academic projects that have helped you gain experience in your application materials are great ways to demonstrate your abilities to support the research efforts.

3- Apply to the research position posting. If a specific position is not posted, feel free to email the contact person or researcher directly, expressing interest in a research position. Share your resume, cover letter, and class schedule, as well as the number of hours weekly you may be able to commit to research. While many research opportunities are unpaid, we suggest mentioning if you have been granted federal workstudy funds. In your email, we also suggest asking what the appropriate next steps might be in the process of securing a research role with them.

4- Follow up on the opportunity five business days after applying or reaching out if you haven't heard back prior. Please be patient in this process- many researchers will be in the field or lab and/or unable to answer emails on a regular basis.



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Graduate School Application Process


Unlike the undergraduate college application process, there is no common application for graduate study (except for professional programs like Law, Medical, Dental, and various Allied Health programs). Candidates apply to each graduate program of interest via an online program/school application.

No two graduate programs and graduate schools are exactly the same. As such, each program will have unique application requirements. Please ensure you fully understand what each program is requiring and follow their directions exactly as requested. If you have questions about their requirements, please contact each program or school's admissions team for clarification.

application deadlines as well as timelines for submitting letters of recommendation, taking placement tests, finalizing writing application materials, applying for financial aid, etc.

GUIDELINES FOR PERSONAL STATEMENTS AND STATEMENTS OF PURPOSE

Overall goal:

Express and/or reinforce your interest and unique insights, strengths, and qualities to the school's admission team that might not be apparent in the rest of your application materials

What are schools looking for?:

- Well-developed responses to their prompt. Every school has a slightly different request- know exactly what each school is looking for and make sure to address everything requested
- · Strong sense of your authentic self and how your values match the school's values
- · Focus on personal strengths
- Clear vision on potential post-graduation goals
- · Confidence, growth mindset, and solutions-based orientation
- Resilience and maturity
- · Indications of ability to make valuable contributions in and out of your future classrooms, graduating class, and future career field
- Formatting as per each school's specifications, generally two-pages

What to avoid!:

- · Not addressing the school's prompt directly or following their directions
- · Writing your entire life story instead of focusing on what's most important for the admissions team to know about you
- · Sharing weaknesses that haven't been actively addressed
- Omitting insights regarding the relevant life lessons you have experienced that are motivating you to further your education
- Writing passively and/or ornately in a way that is inauthentic to your
- · Using cliché, over-used quotes (instead of sharing your own perspectives)
- Insincerity
- Typos!

- Research graduate programs you might be interested in

- Check your unofficial transcript to make sure everything is in order
- Begin exploring financial aid options

Spring & summer of Senior year

- Apply to remaining grad programs
- Complete financial aid applications
- Identify & talk with advocates including faculty, current students, & alumni to help you make your final decision
- Order transcripts
- Start exploring housing options and employment opportunities
- Take some time to RELAX!

Freshman & Sophomore years

- Choose a major that aligns with your academic and personal interests
- Learn how to balance coursework and extracurriculars successfully
- Join student organizations that relate to your interests
- Engage in experiential learning opportunities including internships, study abroad, research, community service, etc.

Fall of Senior Year

- Verify application deadlines
- Start applying to programs with early deadlines(allow plenty of time!)
- Attend Graduate Schools Fair in Oct.

Taking Time Off Before Graduate or Law School

Understandably not all students feel ready to go to graduate or law school right after graduation. Taking time off is a subjective decision based on personal and professional needs.

Taking time off for the sole purpose of studying for the GRE or LSAT is not impressive to school admissions representatives. Schools are looking for authentic and diverse candidates who will add to the classroom and make effective and resilient professionals one day. Take advantage of the time to explore different

industries you might be interested in while rounding out your life experi-

Time to refl.ect

Think about what you want your resume to look like for the admissions teams, and think about ways that you can explore the field(s) you enjoy while getting experience that will strengthen your resume. The schools expect candidates to have a strong sense of personal interests, values, and passions. Taking the time to explore what you are passionate about will prove invaluable to the graduate or law school application

Campus employment

Graduate Assistantships are oncampus jobs that are limited to graduate students. Some might be in the department or lab of your program. Assistantships provide either hourly pay, tuition remission, and/or a stipend. The amount awarded varies by position. We recommend exploring your potential graduate school's academic department or employment website for potential employment opportunities. Common positions include:


• Jobs in Residential Life/Housing: At some institutions, departments of residential life offer jobs that provide tuition benefits, a

stipend, free housing, and meal plans, such as a Resident Advisor, RA Supervisor, or front desk attendant.


